Carers: The forgotten patient?

Many carers in Australia are providing 40 hours or more of unpaid care per week, more than half provide at least 20 hours per week of care. This week we will focus on learning about the role and care of the carer.

Carers in Australia

- There are over 2.65m carers across Australia
- 7 out of 10 carers are women
- The average age of a primary carer is 54
- 1 in 11 carers are under the age of 25
- One-third of primary carers provide 40 hours or more of unpaid care per week

Carers: The forgotten patient?

In 2002, Brodaty & Green published a paper called "Who cares for the carer? The often forgotten patient". Specifically about carers of those with dementia, he described evidence that being a carer has adverse psychological, physical, financial and social effects. They stated that health professionals should be considering carers as patients in their own right as well as an informant, legal consent provider and monitor of treatment outcomes. This is a large burden on those who are really volunteers in this role.
